The story of one of Bath`s most historic buildings compiled by Neil Mattingly

Introduction

Charlotte's Town House at no. 21 Charlotte Street is nearly 150 years old and has a fascinating history which I hope to uncover on the following pages. It was built in 1871 at the height of the Victorian Era in Bath. It was one of the last houses to be constructed along the Street. The first were those on the opposite side which have a distinctive Georgian appearance to them from 1839. These were designed by the famous Bath Architect, George Manners. It would seem that he intended to repeat them on the other side and three of these were built at either end. Time or money must have run out as it wasn't to be finished until thirty years later when local builder, Thomas Shackell filled the gap with distinctively Victorian style bow fronted dwellings.

The earlier history of the site on which the Street was to be built is worth considering. The field on which it was to rise formed part of the large Barton Farm which stretched to its farmhouse where the rear of Jolly's department store is today. John Wood had leased the first of the fields that constituted in 1729 from Robert Gay to begin his Queens Square development. With his son, John, they went on to create Gay Street, the Circus and The Royal Crescent and surrounding streets. This western expansion of the city continued after them and by the beginning of the 19th century there was a need to connect the north west corner of Queens Square with the Upper Bristol Road which had become the main commercial route. After the death of Robert Gay in 1738 the estate went to the Rivers family and passed through the generations until its final sale of ground rents in 1920. It was from Lady Charlotte Rivers, the wife of Sir Henry Rivers that the Street was to named. Work began in 1839 from the western end on a terrace of eleven houses to culminate in two fine buildings. The first of these was Bath Savings Bank by George Alexander in 1841 in neo-Italian high renaissance style. and the second the Moravian Chapel designed by James Wilson in 1844 in Roman revival style. It wasn't until 1854 that the Percy Chapel designed by Goodridge and Son was to rise on the opposite side.

At the rear of Charlotte Street were a large group of workshops and storage that fronted Monmouth Place. Among these was that of the builder Thomas Shackell at no.19. He had moved there in 1853, when he was 25. He paid £20 to Sir James Francis Rivers for a house with workshops on a 21 year lease. In a later advert in the Bath Chronicle, he describes himself as a Builder, Carpenter, Undertaker and General Contractor. He also was able to supply plans for "buildings in all its various branches". He had earlier been in partnership with a Mr. Care and this was dissolved in 1853.

In 1856 he married Jane Stone and they went on to have seven children. The 1861 Census shows him as a master carpenter and builder at the same address. He continued to prosper and in the next census was shown as employing 10 men and 2 boys. In March of that year, he leased the adjoining plot to his house in Monmouth Place from John Inman, the Executor for the Rivers family for £22 a year. On this he buildt himself a workshop and houses, the designs of which are still to be seen in Bath Record Office. He later goes on to lease the remaining land that fronts Charlotte Street from the Rivers Estate and designed and built eight houses(15 - 21) on it during the same year.

It is sad to read that after all the time and effort in building the houses he lost financially and was declared bankrupt in 1873. In August of that year there is an auction of everything that he owned including his home and workshops. He was shown as living at Charlotte House (22) on the corner. He had let all the other houses on Charlotte Street from £17 to £37 a year rent. There was also another property, no. 32 Belvedere that was included in the Auction.

Thomas next move was away from Bath to Weston Super Mare, where at the age of 46 he took on the lease of the Bath Arms Inn with his wife, Jane. That is not the end of the story as he later returned back to his roots to his father's home: Crundale House, Prior Park Road, which is where he was living at the time of his death in 1904, aged 76.

The 1873 Rates for 21 Charlotte Street has Francis Edmund Potts briefly renting from Thomas Shackell who was living at 22 until the lease was sold in the Auction. He was a Chemist based at 18-19 Northumberland Place, off the High Street in Bath. He first appeared there in 1858, when he was living at Sydenham Villa, Lower Bristol Road. Francis was a regular advertiser in the Bath Chronicle and promoted ranges of Patent Medicines and Horniman's Pure Tea. He also sold his own brand of Corn Plasters with a number of endorsements of their benefits.

He only appeared to stay at 21 briefly until selling it to the Rev. Francis Edmund Cheshire in 1876. This gentleman was the incumbent at St. Marks's Church, Wyke in Surrey from 1850 until 1877. He then retired to Bath with his wife and lived at 21 Charlotte Street where he prepared students for Public Schools and University Exams. He regularly advertised in the Bath Chronicle until his death in 1885. His wife continued to live at the address until she died in 1885. Both were buried at his former church at Wyke.

In 1890 Fraulein Emmy Meyhofer advertised for students to teach them German. She was staying as a lodger with William Britton Salisbury who the following year appeared in the census as a Clerk of Works, aged 56. His wife Mary was aged 39 and they had four young children living with them. They originated from Newbury where he was a Master Builder. In 1890 Edwin Wise was also shown at the address. He was a Wardrobe Dealer running his business at the rear of the house. The 1901 Census reveals that the house was occupied by a wealthy spinster, Mary Agnes Murgatroyd, who was aged 71 in that year. She was the former landlady of the Queens Square Tavern until 1882 when she retired. Directories show that Edwin Wise was still running his business from the address until 1910. The following year Miss Rosa Tice, aged 60 described as a Dressmaker and Lodging House Keeper lived there with her friend, Miss C. Skuse . Rosa was to reside there for nearly thirty years and was 92 when she died in 1939.

During the Second World War the house was taken over by the government and there were up to 15 men shown living there at that time. Afterwards Guy Phelps appears in the Rate Books as occupying it with five other people. In 1955 Harry and Nellie Creasey moved from Battle in Sussex to Bath and are shown living at 21 Charlotte Street. When he dies in 1961, aged 66, his wife remains at the property until it was sold in 1967 to Phyllis Cernajeves. She was born Phyllis Vera Hodge in 1925 and it was in 1957 that she married in Chippenham, Janis Cernajevs who originated from Latvia. They had a son, Alexander Nickoli who was born in 1964. The family were to occupy the house for nearly 50 years. After Janis died in 1996, his wife continued to live there until her own death in 2016, aged 91. Her son Alexander inherited the house and was to die tragically in 2018, aged just 54.

The following year the property was sold to Paul and Daria Mattingly who renovated the house and renamed it Charlotte's Town House.


The Rivers family – Owners of Charlotte Street from 1839 until they sold it in 1870.

Although Charlottes Street was not built until 1839, the land it stood on has an interesting history which I have briefly summarised here. It was originally part of the Barton Farm of Bath, which belonged to the Crown, but was held by the Priory of the Monastic Grange from the mid 13th century. The Estate passed through several hands over the years. In 1591 the Colhurst family who owned it at that time sold it to Sir George Snigge who passed it on to his son. He in turn assigned it to his sister, Mary Jackson. It was later passé on to the Saunders family. The estate was settled on Robert Gay in 1699 on his marriage to Mary Saunders. Robert Gay was a Surgeon of London and Bath and later served as M.P. For Bath. Mary died in 1708 and Robert remarried Margaret Farmer. Upon his death in 1737 he left his estate to his daughter, Margaret Gay who married Thomas Garrard the following year. Dying in 1774 with no children Margaret Garrard bequeathed her estate to her brother-in-law Sir Benet Garrard with a request to convey the estate to Sir Peter Rivers, contingent on him taking the name of Gay. Sir Benet Garrard died in 1767 leaving in his Will the Walcot estate to Sir Peter Rivers. The estate was to pass through the family over a number of generations as shown here until a major part including Wood Street was finally sold by them in 1920.


Sir Peter Rivers inherited the Baronetcy upon the death of his brother Sir John in 1743. Both Sir Peter and his younger son Henry, later Sir Henry, became Reverends at Winchester Cathedral, where many of the family were also buried.

Upon Sir Peter Rivers Gay's death in 1790 the estate passed to Sir Thomas Rivers Gay eldest son of Sir Peter with Martha Coxe, daughter of William Coxe of London. Sir Thomas, dying in 1805 with no children, bequeathed the estate to his mother Dame Martha Rivers Gay, who managed the estate until 1834 when she settled it on the then Sir Henry Rivers, her younger son, before dying shortly thereafter in 1835. Upon his death in 1851 the estate passed to his eldest surviving son Sir James Francis Rivers. At the time of Sir Henry Rivers' death, the estate was mortgaged to its greatest extent, Sir James Francis Rivers married Catherine Eastcott a Widow, of Bath, in 1867 but died childless in 1869, the estate passed to his only surviving brother Sir Henry Chandos Rivers who then died a year later in 1870 also childless; with no male heir the Baronetcy was therefore extinguished.

The estate was bequeathed, in trust, by Sir Henry Chandos Rivers to Thomas Frederick Inman, a solicitor of Bath, who then managed the estate as a trustee on behalf of Sir Henry Chandos Rivers' surviving sisters and their children until 1903 when the trusteeship was passed to Henry Mills Skrine and the Rev. Prebendary Benjamin Norton Thompson. From the early 20th Century the estate began to be sold, with Sale auctions known to have been held in 1908, 1919, and 1920; the final parts of the estate that still belonged to descendants of Sir Henry Chandos' sisters are believed to have been sold in the 1980s.




Early Images of the Barton Farm field on which Charlotte Street was to be created.




Bristol Road and field on which Charlotte Street was to be built from a map of Bath by Savile in 1600.



Bristol Road and field on which Charlotte Street was to be built from a map of Walcot by Thomas Thorpe in 1740.




Bristol Road and field on which Charlotte Street was to be built from a map of Bath by Gilmore in 1690.




Bristol Road and fields on which Charlotte Street was to be built in a view of Bath by Harvey Wood in 1824.




A 1835 Map of Bath showing first buildings in Charlotte Street.




An 1845 Map of Bath showing Charlotte Street with Chapel and Savings Bank.







George Manners original plans for Charlotte Street dating from 1833


Bath record Office has a number of deeds from the Rivers Estate (0810) relating to Charlotte Street. Many of the properties that were built have plans, some of which are shown here. The earliest is dated 13th April 1833 for Charlotte Street House (no.22) and the last for 1848. They are signed by George Manners who later went on to design many of them.









The description of nos. 15 and 16 match the building that was later renamed 22 Charlotte street. The shop was in the occupation of Mr. Sargent as a Sadler in the 1841 Census. The buildings and offices at the rear would eventually be taken over by Thomas Shackell, who was to build no. 22 Charlotte Street at the front.







The original Indenture is dated 13th April 1833 when Dame Martha Rivers Gay, of Winchester, Lady of the Manor of Walcot. Gives James *Ridewood* of Bath, Mason and 3. George Ripley, of Bath, Plumber a plot of land, bounded on the southwest by the road leading from Bath to Bristol, on the north by the new intended street to be called Charlotte Street.(B&NES Record Office - 0810/2/1)


The original plan for no. 22 Charlotte Street by George Manners compared with plan of 1888 below.

No 22 Charlotte Street stands out against its neighbours as its appearance and height are very different. The records show that it may have been the first that was built as the original plans by George Manners date back to 1833. Its original use was for a Saddlers with a shop on the ground floor whose original window can still be seen on the side.



In 1851 William Fisher is in Charlotte Street House now called Queens Square Place he is described as a Slater and Plasterer employing 10 men his son Charles is a Grocer on the premises.



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



The Rivers family had mortgaged their large Walcot Estate over the years and after the death of Sir Henry Chandos Rivers in 1870, their solicitor. Thomas Inman auctioned a number of these off to reduce their debt. He managed the estate as a trustee on behalf of the surviving sisters and their children until 1903. On October 31st there was an auction held by Mr. Rainey where a number were sold including those in Charlotte Street. A copy of the catalogue has survived in the Bath Record Office and is displayed here which gives important information on the tenants and owners of properties. The accompanying plan provides a snapshot of completed houses in that year before Thomas Shackell was to complete it with nos.15 to 21 the following year. It is interesting to see that no. 22 was called Charlotte Street House at that time and was owned by Mr. G. Edwards and Mr. Morgan Eades who ran his Grocers shop there.


The 1870 Auction Map showing the first stage of buildings in Charlotte Street.






"This Indenture made the 19th day of January 1870 between Thomas Frederick Inman of the City of Bath, Gentleman of the one part and Thomas Shackell of the same City, Builder of the other part Witnessed that in the consideration of the perpetual yearly rent charge herein after reserves or made payable. He the said Thomas Fredrick Inman pursuant to an agreement under seal interned into in this behalf by the late Sir Henry Chandos Rivers, Baronet deceased and as trustee of the Will and devisee of the real estate of the said Sir Henry Chandos Rivers doth herby grant convey and dispose of unto the said Thomas Shackell his heirs and assigns All that plot of Land situated in the Parish of Walcot in the City of Bath delineated in the Plan drawn on the back of the second skin of this presents together with the newly erected message Theron called or intended to be called Number 21 Charlotte Street in the same City together with the arches under Charlotte Street and together with all buildings, walls, fences, ways drains savers, lights, easements and appurtenances to the said plot of ground and messuage belonging or therwith used or enjoyed and together with the benefit of all existing covenants restricting or affecting the enjoyment of any adjoining or neighbour"....

Thomas Shackell – builder of 22 Charlotte Street in 1871

At the rear of Charlotte Street were a large group of workshops and storage that were fronted by Monmouth Place. Among these was that of the builder Thomas Shackell at no. 19. He had moved there in 1853, when he was 25. He paid £20 to Sir James Francis Rivers for a house with workshops on a 21 year lease. In a later advert in the Bath Chronicle, he describes himself as a Builder, Carpenter, Undertaker and General Contractor. He also was able to supply plans for "buildings in all its various branches". He had earlier been in partnership with a Mr. Care and this was dissolved in 1853.

In 1856 he married Jane Stone and they went on to have seven children. The 1861 Census shows him as a master carpenter and builder at the same address. He continues to do well and in the next census is shown as employing 10 men and 2 boys. In March of that year, he leases the adjoining plot to his house in Monmouth Place from John Inman, the Executor for the Rivers family for £22 a year. On this he builds himself a workshop and houses, the designs of which are still to be seen in Bath Record Office. He later goes on to lease the remaining land that fronts Charlotte Street from the Rivers Estate and designed and built eight houses(15 - 21) on it during the same year.

It is sad to read that after all the time and effort in building the houses he lost financially and was declared bankrupt in 1873. In August of that year there is an auction of everything that he owns including his home and workshops. He is shown as living at Charlotte House on the corner. He had let all the other houses on Charlotte Street from £17 to £37 a year rent. There was also another property, no. 32 Belvedere that was included in the Auction.





Thomas Shackell – builder of 22 Charlotte Street in 1871

Thomas Shackell leased some buildings and land from the Rivers Estate in March for £22 a year in 1871 and built the cottages, offices and workshops for his business at nos. 18-19 Monmouth Place. The plans below can be seen in the Bath Record Office today (0064/3/6). Nos. 18 and 18a have since been demolished for a car park.

It is astonishing to think today that the builder of nos.15 to 21 Charlotte Street and the group of buildings behind it was accomplished by Thomas Shackell in just three years. It is tragic that at the end of all that he had accomplished that his money should run out and all was to be auctioned shortly afterwards and he was to be declared bankrupt. The view below is an aerial photo showing the area today that he transformed between 1871 and 1873.




During the Second World War the house was taken over by the government and there were up to 15 men shown living there at that time. Afterwards Guy Phelps appears in the Rate Books as living there with five other people. In 1955 Harry and Nellie Creasey move from Battle in Sussex to Bath and are shown living at 21 Charlotte Street. When he dies in 1961, aged 66, his wife remains at the property until it was sold in 1967 to Phyllis Cernajeves. She was born Phyllis Vera Hodge in 1925 and it was in 1957 that she married in Chippenham, Janis Cernajevs who originated from Latvia. They had a son, Alexander Nickoli who was born in 1964. The family were to occupy the house for nearly 50 years. After Janis died in 1996, his wife continued to live there until her own death in 2016, aged 91. Her son Alexander inherited the house and was to die tragically in 2018, aged just 54.

The following year the property was sold to Paul and Daria Mattingly who renovated the house and renamed it Charlotte's Town House.


1885 Map of Charlotte Street




1885 Map of Charlotte Street




1936 Map of Charlotte Street




1965 Map of Charlotte Street




1976 Map of Charlotte Street


